


Every year, BC Student Outcomes collects feedback from former students who took post-secondary programs. Student feedback is essential to maintain quality and relevance in the education system.

### Baccalaureat Graduates




Baccalaureatestudents are surveyed within two years of graduation.

#### **Baccalaureate Programs**

The largest percentage of the baccalaureate graduates who were surveyed had taken an Arts and Sciences program, which includes Social Sciences, Humanities, Biological Science and Life Sciences, and Physical Sciences and Math programs.

#### **Education Evaluations**

The majority of baccalaureate graduates said their programs helped them develop skills, especially the ability to analyse and think critically.

Most (91 percent) of the graduates surveyed said they weerge satisfied or satisfied with the overall education they received from their program.


#### Funding

#### **Employment**

The 2020 Baccalaureate Gradusateurvey was conducted from September 2020 to February 2021, during the COVID-19 pandemic. While the labour force participation rate (those working or looking for work) and the employment rate (the number of employed out of all respondentse) mained stable for baccalaureate graduates, the unemployment rate showed an increase when compared to respondents from the 2019 survey. In last year's survey, baccalaureate graduates reported similar labour force and employment rates.

# Associate Degree, Diploma, and Certificate Programs

Note that there are no trades programs uded with the associate degree, diploma, and certificate programs.sAlnote that the associate degree grouping includes university transfer programs.


Just over one-quarter of the former students surveyed had taken a Business & Management program, of which a majority were diploma programs. Two-thirds of Health programs were taken for a certificate credential, while ithe Arts & Sciences, students tended to seek associate degree credentials. Note: Programs are grouped using the BC CIP Cluster, a roll-up based on the <u>Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP</u>). Credentials have been grouped so that associate degree includes university transfer programs; diploma includes advanced and post-degree diplomas; certificate includes post-degree certificates.

TransferCredits Most of the former associatedegree




#### **Employment**

Results are reported for diplomad certificate graduates only. Associate degree students are less li In last year's survey, diploma and certificate graduates reported lower unemployment rates.

Employment outcomes for graduates of diploma and certificate programs were good: most respondents were working in an education-related, employer-paidermanent position, typically full-time. Approximately 4 percent were self-employed.



Employment Characteristics

Most of the employed diploma and certificate graduatesworked in a permanent, full time position in a field that was related to their educational program.

The percentages for education related job are of those who said their job was very or somewhat related. The median hourly wage for diploma and certificate graduates who were employed full-time was \$24;**0**0r those employed part-time, it was \$21.88.







Most (92 percent) of the respondents who were employed as apprentices or who had work placements outside their institutions werevery satisfied satisfied with their workplace experience.



Satisfied with Workplace Formerapprenticeship studentswere satisfied with their workplace training.



#### Pathway to Apprenticeship

Questions about getting an apptieeship are asked of trades foundation students only.

After finishing their foundationprograms, 82 percent of former trades foundation students tried to find employment as apprentices. Of those former students, 81 percent were successful in getting employment as an apprentice.

A majority (71 percent) of those who became apprentices said their program prepared them very wellor well for their apprenticeship training.




Preparedfor Apprenticeship A majority of the trades foundation studentswho became apprenticeswere well prepared.

#### **Employment**

The Survey of Former Trades Students was conducted from January to June of 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic began to affect the labour market as early **dds**arch 2020. While most former trades students were participating in the labour force at the time they were surveyed, their unemployment rates were higher than the previous year.



Notes: The labour force participation rate is the number of respondentsemployedor looking for work as a percentage of all respondents. The employment rate is the number of employed as a percentage of all respondents. The unemployment rate is the number of unemployed as a percentage of respondents in the labour force.
